



# **PEDESTRIAN SAFETY ON MIDDLERIDGE ROADS**

Reminder: For the safety of both pedestrians and motorists, Virginia law states (Sec. 46.2-928) that "Pedestrians shall not use the roadways for travel, except when necessary to do so because of the absence of sidewalks which are reasonably

suitable and passable for their use." Some of our residents have observed walkers, occasionally in groups, utilizing a good portion of streets in Middleridge in a manner that may obstruct traffic flow and present safety concerns. Consider that at certain times of day, such as dusk, dawn, or when the sun angles just so, natural lighting conditions may impair a driver's ability to see pedestrians (such as when it shines directly in a driver's eyes). Being in the streets at these times poses


an increased hazard. Walkers may be more likely to be struck or contribute to a driving mishap. From an accident liability standpoint, depending on factors such as whether a driver was speeding, police could find either the driver or pedestrian to

> be at fault. Regardless, we should acknowledge the fact that many drivers really speed down our streets--especially "thoroughfares" like Paynes Church--and that poses a risk. We can look out for ourselves and each other by exercising smart risk management and following



the established rules. Please use the sidewalks OR keep to the far left of the street, facing traffic!

"We didn't even get to see the house when we bought it because it wasn't built yet. I told them 'just don't make it gray.' It was gray when we moved in," Becky added with a laugh.

Over 52 years, they: made many home improvements including two major additions, raised their family, tended to the gardens, and made amazing friends. The card that accompanied the gifted photo of their home said it well...

- **04.** There was a one-way bridge to get to Occoquan. People had to take turns to cross it.
- **05.** Becky said, "Back then, people in Middleridge didn't come out and talk to each other. It's much nicer and more social now!"
- **06.** And here are some bonus lessons they learned in 50+ gardening seasons:

Don't plant annuals until after
Mother's Day

Don't plant a Bradford Pear
Tree (they're invasive, messy, and stinky)
